Description: With a focus on preserving the stories of the United States Colored Troops, African American, European and Hispanic involvement in the American Civil War, this museum features photographs, portraits, documents, technology and display cases with uniforms and weaponry to make an environment focused on creating a meaningful learning experience as regards a pivotal time in U.S. history.

Description: A former winter residence of an American diplomat's family, the Anderson House is serving now as a museum to showcase knowledge and appreciation of the achievement of American independence by having extensive art collections. Also, it includes a walled garden, tennis court, carriage house, and fifty rooms all ornately decorated and lined with pieces of art. More than four thousand objects in the museum preserve and interpret the history of the Revolutionary War, the Society of the Cincinnati, and the Anderson House itself.

Additionally, there are seasonal exhibits centered around anything from film history, noteworthy Hollywood directors and composers, music generally, or key political movements.

Description: Built in 1892 by local brewer Christian Heurich, this mansion is now a museum of 31 rooms that showcases the family's life, history, and information regarding the brewery. A lavish and intricate architectural feat, the Heurich House Museum is noted for its fire-proof construction and incorporation of modern technologies (e.g., an elevator shaft, electric communication systems, and full indoor plumbing).

Description: Formerly the home of Mrs. Merriweather Post, the Hillwood Estate features the country's most comprehensive collection of Russian imperial art outside of Russia (such as Faberge eggs and porcelain), distinguished 18th century French decorative art, and 25 acres of serene gardens with marble statues, water features, flowers in abundance, quaint courtyards, etc.

On display in the museum are stations detailing pivotal battles, weaponry and uniforms such as 1775 muskets used at Concord Bridge and photographs of soldiers and battlefields.

Description: Home to a variety of artifacts from America's history, from Ali's boxing gloves to Washington's sword, The National Museum of American History offers information of the exhibits and pieces featured that include: a 1970s Elmo doll, Dorothy's ruby slippers, James Brown's piano, maps of battles and almanacs that were related to the American Revolution or Civil War, a Tucker automobile, a restored UH-1H Huey Helicopter from Vietnam, and a comprehensive hip-hop exhibit tracing its influence across cultures including sports, graffiti, fashion, dance, language and technology.

Activity Idea!

To furthering overall awareness of the country's origins and authenticity, the museum and library together maintain memorabilia (such as documents, photographs, journals, etc.) from the 1784 – 1815 period.

Activity Idea!

The museum's architecture, natural landscaping, and exhibitions all were designed collaboratively with Native tribes from across the continent to give visitors a sense of the spirit of the Native Americans. Featured collections include works of aesthetic, religious, daily, and historical significance – jars with painted designs, beaded moccasins, woven pouches, skin kayaks, masks, pipes, and many more objects are featured alongside informational displays.

The museum directly addresses the gender imbalance in the presentation of art in the U.S. and abroad; to fulfill this mission there is a collection of 4,500 objects, an 18,500-volume library and research center, 10 world-class exhibitions of women artists each year, and a variety of performance events (e.g., concerts and films).

Beyond the collections of paintings, textiles, ceramics, silver, and period furniture the House also offers seasonal concerts, picnic events, rentable spaces for events such as weddings, luncheons, etc., and is the headquarters of The National Society of the Colonial Dames of America.

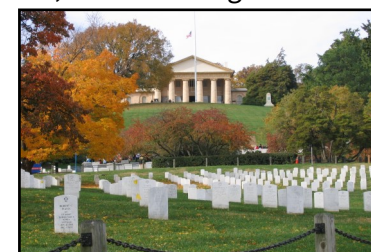

Description: Arlington National Cemetery was established during civil war. It serves a cemetery and memorial to America's persons of national importance including presidents, Supreme Court justices and countless military heroes. It is also known as a final resting place for Union soldiers on Mary Custis Lee's 1,100 acre Arlington estate.

The property was expanded over the years to encompass more than 624 acres of burial grounds of more than 400,000 American servicemen.

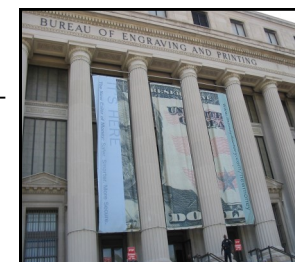

The gardens and grounds were used for growing vegetables, fruits, flowers, and trees, heritage breed animal pastures with hogs, cattle, chickens, horses, and oxen, the tomb of Washington's family, the slave memorial and burial ground, the pioneer farm, and the wharf on the Potomac river.

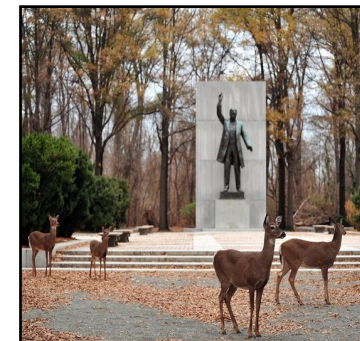
